GOOD TO KNOW: MAY 8TH DAY OF ACTION

For the first time in Oregon history, teachers and staff are planning a day of action to advocate for school funding. I will share my letter of the whys of this early next week. This is a day to take action, as the Oregon legislation continues to underfund public schools. Teachers are standing up as a voice FOR our students, because your child deserves high quality education. We are inviting all families, students, and community supporters to join us at 11:00 AM at the Tom McCall Waterfront for a rally and march. Many members of the SES community will attend this event to demand full funding for education.

Here are some quick facts for why I will be there:

- Oregon is ranked #37 out of 50 in k-12 education by US News
- In 2018, Oregon's high school graduation rate was 78.8%
 - o I grew up in a public school district that had a 93% graduation rate in Boulder, CO
 - This is the second worst graduation rate in the country.
- Out of my 8 years of teaching, 7 of these years were budget cut years to staff.
- Out of my 8 years of teaching, the school I work at has been given additional staff 0 years.
- I've never had a class size under 28, and I have taught a class of 36 in a portable with no EA.

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

LITERACY:

Wowieeee students have been working hard to tackle nonfiction reading. We have been using sets of texts on immigration to 1. Select accessible sources 2. Name a subtopic 3. Take notes (read a chunk-pause to think-jot) 4. Add to our notes on the same



subtopic across texts. All students also selected a good fit book that either features Latinx characters and/or is about immigration from around the world. These stories will help deepen our understanding of the many different stories of immigrant people. We continue to read The Only Road, and are using a map of Guatemala, Mexico, and the U.S. to chart our characters' journey across the border. In writing, students are adding to their background knowledge of immigration by doing research projects an individual country from Latin America. This project will allow us to put our nonfiction reading skills to use as well as connecting to immigration stories of people we learn about.

MATH:

During a substitute day last week, our class had a challenging time when given problem solving! So, we are working in small groups to solve a sub sandwich fractions problem that involves thinking about sharing something equally when you don't have the same number of items as people. After some problem solving time, we will work on adding fractions with common denominators (4ths) and multiplying fractions by a whole number (5ths). Both grades will also practice writing down their explanations to their thinking. Our next steps for 4th graders are to connect fractions to decimals, then explore geometry & measurement. Our 5ths have a lengthy fractions unit ahead, for various operations.
